



This was the fourth in the series of SOMA - ECS Provincial Youth Coordinators' Regional Workshops' training Youth Leaders. Partnered by the Diocese of Salisbury Sudan Link, the workshop's aims are to encourage youth leaders and leaders in their ministry, to equip them with resources they can pass on

and to promote sustainable peace by creating respect and value for human life.

The Bentiu, Unity State location for the

Youth Leaders', Clergy, Pastors', Evangelists' and Lay Leaders' Conference came at the recommendation of Archbishop Daniel Deng, the instigation of Provincial Youth Coordinator Evans Gogonya and the request of the Bishop of Bentiu, John Gattek.

The local atmosphere was one of anticipation for what was then the forthcoming Referendum and also of concern over the proximity of the border to Bentiu. The delegates consisted of Youth Leaders

supplemented by some other church leaders and army chaplains - there are thousands of troops stationed nearby.

The five day conference focused on the power of the Holy Sprit to heal, reconcile, release, forgive and so further equip the delegates for mission and ministry in the future.

The fruits of the ministry? Let the delegates share them in their own words...

We came in on our knees but now we are walking.

I am very happy. If I was a dog you would see my tail is very busy!

This ministry is of the Holy Spirit - the power to unite us as brothers and sisters... the centre of liberty... makes us know we are one.

Nothing else can bring us together except the Holy Spirit. Your presence blessed me so much.

We are very happy, thanks to God for His protection and bringing us together. God is with us, who can be against us?

God made us learn more through this conference.

You have stood with us - God will bless vou.'

Bishop John, our host, at the close of the conference, gave thanksgiving to God for His unfailing love and protection and for those who had organised, ministered, prayed and supported the conference workshop in Bentiu. The Team also added their thanksgiving for those who accommodated us in their own home compound and those who worked hard so that the programme proceeded in the face of many challenges.

SOMA's ministry seeks the transformation of communities. Evans reports that later 'One senior Government official from the Bentiu area came to thank us for what we did in Bentiu, he said the Government of South Sudan appreciated the big effort done in planting the seeds of strong faith, love, forgiveness, unity and reconciliation. He requested me to convey their heart felt gratitude to you all.'

For the Team there was blessing through the challenges too. Naomi: 'He is certainly





able to do 'more than we can ever ask for or even image' and is certainly the 'everlasting arms underneath us!' I saw that 'I can do all things through Him who strengthens me' ... God's financial provision was amazing prior to me going, I felt God went ahead of me in the way of finance. The trip fed me hugely in every way and has helped my mindset be more secure in the truths and faithfulness of Christ. I have felt an equipping and encouragement of gifts and a renewed stirring for further overseas work in the future. In short empowering and enlightening. The intercessory aspect of SOMA was new to me in that I had not realised how seriously this role is taken on and I have valued it hugely.'

For Kate it was: 'Trusting and drawing on Him to enable me to do things I wouldn't have thought I could do.'

Ron said: 'It was amazing to be alongside those whose faith has been forged in the midst of suffering.'

Royston wrote: 'It was an exciting part of my adventure of faith, full of the power of the Holy Spirit and the real presence of God as I observed Christ at work in others.'

# **Envisioned and Blessed**

First time SOMA Team member Chris
Casey shares his reflections on the SOMA
mission to Arua, Diocese of Madi West
Nile, Uganda. Diocesan Bishop Joel Obetia
had said "Discovering your gifts makes
you work closely with others in harmony
and as a team to serve a given purpose.
People discover how best to fit in their
respective positions and how to support
each other more effectively." The Team
were invited to help further this vision for
the Diocese.

The Team was greeted by Bishop Joel who was overjoyed at seeing the realisation of a dream of his to bring a SOMA Team to his diocese. Following the joyful celebrations for the fifth anniversary of the consecration of Bishop Joel, the SOMA Conference began on Monday 29 November. Our first encounter with the seventy plus clergy delegates quickly alerted us to a group of ministers who seemed weary, hard pressed, in need of encouragement and a fresh touch from God the Holy Spirit. Fortunately for us the Team and conference was being covered by a large number of intercessors back home - and all felt the benefit of it.

When Team leader Kevin Roberts,
Archdeacon of Carlisle, invited me to be part
of the team of six going on mission to Arua
up in the NW of Uganda I experienced a
sense of genuine excitement. But as time
wore on I experienced a sense of anxiety could I really be of use to the Bishop and his
clergy to whom we were invited to minister?
Could I deliver something that would
somehow make a difference to these dear
people ministering the gospel in such
challenging and demanding contexts?

I received my brief and began to make preparations for my teaching responsibilities which included teaching on the person and work of the Holy Spirit, workshops with colleagues on the gifts of the Holy Spirit, preaching and teaching, a session on facing trials and suffering as well as one on receiving the Holy Spirit.

Once we had arrived in Arua the Team's role was to minister to the clergy, all of whom were seeking to serve congregations who often struggled to financially support their minister.

As the week passed by I became increasingly aware of the nature of the task the clergy and Bishop faced.

There are well patronised churches: one pastor told me he had 400 at morning prayer,

another mentioned how the most popular service amongst the Youth in Arua Cathedral is the 7am morning service. Yet all are congregations thirst for teaching and discipling.

For the population of this rural area live in the borderlands of The Democratic Republic of Congo and on the southern border of Sudan - Islam is a growing force and I heard many experiences of the challenges of working with Muslim neighbours and evangelistic Muslims within one's community. The church's experience with this in the Diocese can greatly inform we in the UK - because in this regard I feel they are years ahead of us.

Our role was to minister to these Pastors who were seeking to serve often poor congregations who could not afford to financially support their ministers - £15 per month is not an uncommon stipend for clergy in Arua.

Under Kevin's leadership it did not take very long for us to establish a rapport with our brothers and sisters. We worshipped together, worked together and even wept together. Ours was the joy of seeing God speak powerfully into their lives, heal some, offer hope to others, answer prayers in wonderful ways and most of all come graciously amongst us to envision and to bless. Here are a hungry people, thirsty for resources, teaching, models of ministry and inspiration to sustain the challenging work they have faithfully begun. It was a privilege for me to be part of this team and to witness firsthand what God did amongst our Ugandan peers.

#### SOMA - Renewal for Mission in the UK

Team members tell how their participation in SOMA's ministry aboard has positively impacted them, their ministry and their community back home.

Revd Chris Casey, of St Andrew's Mirehouse, on his first mission with SOMA was part of the Team to the Diocese of Madi & West Nile, Uganda...

Since returning to UK I have been aware of the need for a greater depth of engagement with the life of the Holy Spirit in my own Parish - I have become more thirsty to see the very things we were teaching about in Africa, and Praise God, there have been some encouraging signs.

Another recently returned Team member, reflecting on how the experience has changed his ministry and mission writes...

I have an increased awareness of God's greatness and involvement in our lives and ministries, leading to an increased expectation in prayer. I was challenged and encouraged by the African Christians' view of prayer as a first resort, in contrast with our Western tendency to try to find a technique to fix a problem and turn to prayer as a last resort. I returned with a renewed determination to pray for the country we ministered in.

A third says...

I thought I would let you know how our Lord through the work of SOMA has been part of my personal renewal. My wife and I have been attending a new home church. Today it was announced to the congregation that I will be joining the ministry team. It is an exciting appointment for me as I shall have very specific leadership responsibilities, as an NSM, within a large church with a vision for growth, evangelism and church planting.

Across their later years the two have been inseparable. Countless SOMA Teams while away on mission are indebted to this partnership for faithful intercession. And when Mary was away with SOMA, Barbara mobilised local prayer for her and the Team.

This partnership epitomised the immense value that we in SOMA places on Intercession. Barbara had worked in Malaya as a midwife in her youth, but her unswerving calling over her latter years was to being the intercession partner at home for Mary and the Teams abroad. She faithfully remembered

the people and details of every team for which she prayed.

My first contact with her, writes Hilary Steynor, was the SOMA telephone prayer chain during Lambeth 1998. Our friendship over the phone grew over the years; she was a huge source of wisdom and personal support to me as SOMA Intercessors' Coordinator.
